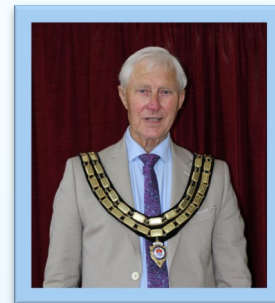
Mayors Message

KINGSTEIGNTON HISTORY BOARDS UNVEILED

At 11am on Saturday 4th November, Captain The Right Honourable Lord Clifford of Ugbrooke House and President of Kingsteignton History Society proudly did the honours of unveiling the History Boards of Kingsteignton at the Fountain, assisted by Kingsteignton Mayor Councillor Ron Peart.

The six panel history boards (the first one of which is interactive and takes you to:- Exeter Museum), contain information dating back to prehistoric times of when people lived in and around Kingsteignton before the last Ice Age began 110,000 years ago, through to this year's Coronation of King Charles III.

References are made to invaders and settlers, the Middle Ages, the beginnings of agriculture, industry and developments, archaeological findings, the history of the Clifford family and its involvement with the town, in particular its water supply, and key dates of what has happened to Kingsteignton in the last 200 years.

Mayor Councillor Ron Peart thanked Lord Clifford for doing the honours of unveiling the history boards and Lady Clifford, Mayoress Mrs June Peart for accompanying them both.

Special thanks were given to Town Clerk Mrs Michelle Lewis-Clarke and Office Assistant Mrs Caroline Lowe for compiling the boards.

Special thanks also to Mr Richard Harris, Chairman of Kingsteignton History Society who had provided the historical information of the former parish and now town.

It is hoped that the residents of our town as well as visitors, will appreciate and learn about the significance that Kingsteignton has in the history of Devon.

KINGSTEIGNTON REMEMBRANCE PARADE

Despite the rain, many local residents and veterans turned out to take part in the Remembrance Sunday Parade. All generations gathered in large numbers to pay their respects to those lost in conflict and show gratitude for their freedom on Sunday 12th November 2023 in Kingsteignton.

The parade was respectfully led by Kingsteignton Royal British Legion's Drummer and Bugler Natalie Parkins, Standard Bearer Dai Orton and Parade Marshal Steve Elliott. Starting from the Royal British Legion Club on Longford Lane, the parade processed along Strawberry Terrace and joined Exeter Road and continued on past the Fountain and up Church Street to St Michael's Church.

The Reverend Sandra Gill and Father Mark Smith welcomed the parade and parishioners to Kingsteignton's Act of Remembrance service. A wreath was laid in church by Hellen Church, Chair of Kingsteignton Royal British Legion. Readings were delivered by students from Teign, St. Michael's Primary and Rydon Primary Schools.

After the church service, Rev'd Gill and the Colour Party processed out to the War Memorial for all to take the time to reflect in the national two minutes silence. Wreaths were laid by Kingsteignton Town Council's Mayor, Cllr Ron Peart, by Mayoress June Peart on behalf of local MP Anne-Marie Morris, Kingsteignton RBL Branch and Club, Post Meridian W.I. and many Kingsteignton uniformed youth groups including Rainbows, Brownies, Guides, Beavers, Cubs, Scouts and Explorers as well as children from the town's schools and Devon and Cornwall Police.

When the act of Remembrance was complete, the Parade reformed and processed to the RBL Club for refreshments.

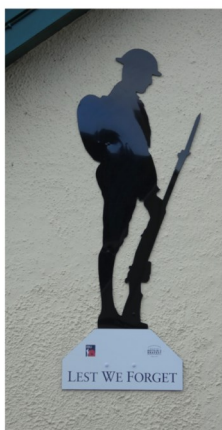

OUR FAIRWATER LEAT AND ITS WILDLIFE

I am sure many of you know the history of the Kingsteignton Leat, more correctly "Fairwater", built by medieval monks and fed by springs to power mills before eventually flowing into the Teign.

It is a reassuring constant in a rapidly changing town, reliably flowing, barely changing, summer or winter, drought or flood.

What many of you might not realise is the abundance of wildlife to be found along it, particularly at the top end near its source where I am lucky enough to live and whose garden backs onto it. Apart from the resident Mallards, I have seen Moorhen, Little Egret and Grey Wagtails.

Most exciting though is Britain's most colourful and fascinating bird, the Kingfisher. More often seen as a blue streak racing past, they do say that only the righteous get to see a Kingfisher!

An alternative, old name is the Halcyon. They were said to have a calming affect on rough seas, hence the expression "Halcyon Days" though they certainly set my heart aflutter!

The best strategy for any wildlife watching or photography is to sit quietly and wait; be patient!

I have built a small hide where I can do just that, and wait..... and wait..... AND THEN..... a small spec in the distance: is it? It gets larger, then it comes powering along the leat like a tiny, blue spitfire!

Will it stop, or just race past?

When it screeches to a halt and drops onto one of my perches my heart soars!

It may only stop very briefly before flying on, allowing me to grab a couple of quick shots; other times it will settle for a spot of fishing. It performs a comical, little, Chaplinesque sideways shuffle up and down the perch, all the while staring intently at the water.

A bob or two then a rapid dive. Seconds later it is back with a fish. When its hunger is satisfied it may stay a while and relax, drying its feathers in the sun and preening.

During those privileged few moments of watching, nothing else in the world exists, it is just me and the Kingfisher

Then, as suddenly as he came, he is gone, my brief, magical meeting with the Kingfisher is over.....

Until the next time.....

Females can be identified by the red colouring to the underside of the lower mandible. Male's beaks are all black.

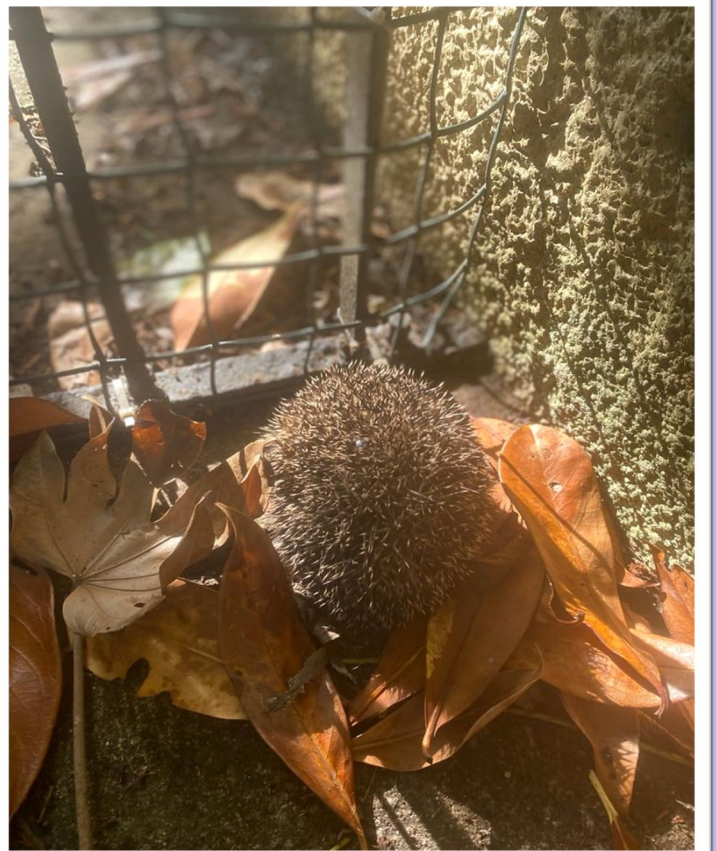
A rough idea of age can be ascertained from the feet, which are almost black when born, gradually turning bright orange as they mature. (This one is probably just a couple of months old).

HEDGEHOG HIGHWAY

Following on from earlier this year when we gave hedgehog highway packs to those who requested them, we are pleased to have received feedback from a couple of our residents.

The first photo shows the hedgehog highway inserted into a gate. The second one shows a very small hedgehog who was out in the daylight, which is not a good sign as they are nocturnal and this often signifies a problem, such as possibly being orphaned, Michelle took this hedgehog to a rescue shelter. The third photo was sent in by Jade, who said: "It's not the best quality as it was from our outdoor camera, but this hedgehog is now a regular visitor in our garden. We got a hedgehog highway pack from one of the stalls at the Ram Roast this year."

Our former Neighbourhood Beat Manager, PC Charlie Haggerty has relocated to Newton Abbot.

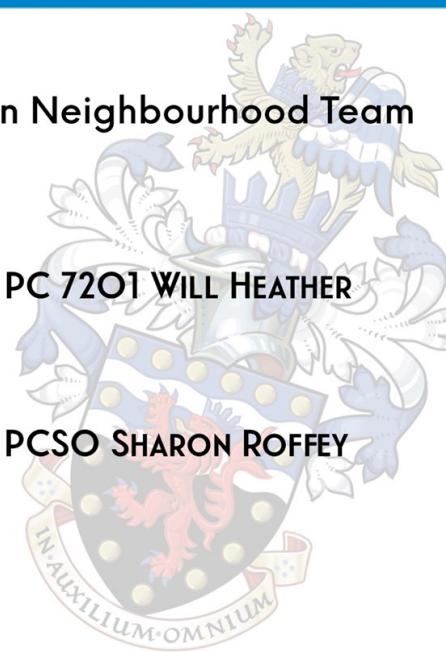

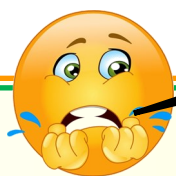
Will 2025 be the last Ram Roasting Fair

The Ram Fair committee take great pride in organising this traditional annual event but our Secretary, Sue, Stalls co-ordinator Liz and Raffle co-ordinator, Jan are retiring after the 2025 Fair. Our Chairman, Malcolm and Treasurer, Keith will stay for one more year and that will leave just one remaining committee member – Emma.

We are making this plea for more people to join us before the knowledge and expertise of the current committee disappears.

Did you know that we have a great band of about SIXTY people who pitch up year on year to help set up, man the gates, sell raffle tickets, pull pints and help close down after everyone has gone home? Some of the local Charity stalls supply helpers too. The Kingsteignton Guides and Rangers run the Hoopla stall all afternoon, the Sea Scouts litter pick and empty the bins, The Kingsteignton Community Baptist Church run the Coconut Shy and Kingsteignton Athletic Football Club mark out the sports pitch and run the races for us. A tremendous effort from our local community.

At this year's Annual General Meeting we distributed **£4,400** to local organisations who supported the 2023 Fair.

These organisations use the Fair to promote what they do in the Kingsteignton Community and, also, raise much needed funds. Without the Fair this opportunity would also cease.
